

## FOR CHILDREN

MEDICATION NAME:	VINCRISTINE/VINBLASTINE
	BRAND: ONCOVIN, VINCASAR.

HOW IS IT GIVEN:	IV push or IV infusion.
HOW DOES IT WORK:	Inhibits the ability of actively dividing cells to complete the process of cell division or to activate. Thought to increase platelet count by decreasing destruction of antibody-coated platelets by its effects on macrophages.
COMMON DOSING REGIMENS:	0.03mg/kg per week over 1-4 weeks.
COMMON SIDE EFFECTS:	Peripheral neuropathy (nerve pain) and motor nerve blockage, constipation, hair loss with vincristine; less neuropathy and more marrow suppression with vinblastine.
RARE BUT SERIOUS SIDE EFFECTS:	Serious skin reactions have been reported if the mediction leaks out of the vein when infusing instead of remaining in the vein.
TYPICAL TIME TO RESPONSE:	1-2 weeks.
LIKELIHOOD OF INITIAL RESPONSE:	10-60%
LIKELIHOOD OF LONG-TERM RESPONSE (3-5 YEARS):	Unlikely.
OTHER CONSIDERATIONS:	May increase the risk of infertility in adolescent populations.
